Climate change strategy and action plans

This week, we've launched our draft climate change strategy and action plans for feedback. These documents are guided by an aspirational vision and include specific, measurable targets.

Strategy and Policy Committee Chairperson, Nándor Tánczos, says feedback from the community about the draft documents is essential to make sure the Council is on the right track. He emphasises that everyone is on the climate change journey together and future planning must reflect that.

"We think we've captured the communities' aspirations, but the feedback process will help shape the final documents," he explains. "I really encourage everyone to tell us what you think. We've created a simple 'quick poll' style survey, which should only take 5-10 minutes of your time."

Annual Plan adopted

The Whakatane District Council's Annual Plan and Fees and Charges for 2020/21 were adopted at an extraordinary Council meeting last month. Ratepayers should expect their rates invoices in the mail this week.

The average rates increase for the Whakatāne District this year is 3.9%, but the percentage differs for specific properties around the district. For an average urban Whakatāne household, the increase translates to about \$122 per year or \$10 per month.

WHY DO RATES INCREASE MORE THAN INFLATION?

We're often asked why rates increase more than inflation. The simple answer is that the things Council has to buy, such as pipes and roading materials, increase at higher rates than household things, like food and clothes.



If you pay your rates in full by the first instalment due date on Friday, 21 August 2020, you'll receive a 2.5% discount.



New safe crossing installed

A new crossing on Hinemoa Street installed recently provides a safe access for pedestrians and cyclists. Part of the Active Whakatāne strategy, the crossing includes a pedestrian refuge island, 'dragon's teeth' line markings and a red carpet – similar to those installed on Landing Road. Designed to link the shared path from King Street to James Street, the new crossing has received positive feedback from a range of users.

"The design works really well for all users," says Bike Whakatāne representative, Richard Hamer. "Drivers see the crossing as they approach the area and have plenty of time to slow down, and pedestrians and cyclists can cross safely with confidence."

This type of line marking is also being trialled at a crossing point on Rewatu Road, to test its effectiveness in a semi-rural environment.

ANNUAL GRANT APPLICATIONS OPEN NOW

Annual Grant applications are now open for 2020/21. These grants provide financial assistance to community-based, non-profit organisations that help the public in the Whakatāne District.

Kia Kaha Whakatāne projects keeping local people working

More than 160 people are currently working on roading, infrastructure and environmental projects throughout the district as part of the Kia Kaha Whakatāne programme – including more than 90 people who were formerly unemployed.

The Kia Kaha Whakatāne programme is made possible through Provincial Growth Fund (PGF) investment. The programme supports roading, infrastructure and environmental projects that are providing urgent economic relief for the workforce, particularly those who have lost jobs through COVID-19.
