

FINANCIAL SCORECARD SHOWS POSITIVE RESULT

A summary of the Whakatāne District Council's 2011/12 Annual Report will be published in the Bay Weekend later in November, with additional run-on copies being printed for distribution to Post Office boxholders and residents in Murupara and rural areas not covered by newspaper deliveries.

The Annual Report is the Council's 'scorecard' and lets you know what we achieved and how we performed during the year to 30 June 2012. We're pleased to report that both our financial and nonfinancial performance improved markedly. We finished the year in a positive financial position, achieving a total operating surplus of \$1.99 million, which was a particularly satisfying outcome because we had to accommodate a number of unanticipated costs within our available budget.

In terms of our non-financial performance, 86 percent of our targets were either achieved, or within 5 percent of the outcomes sought. That compares to 80 percent for the previous year and indicates that we are moving in the right direction. We are committed to building on that improved performance in the coming years.

COKONE SONE

Our programme of capital work - projects undertaken to maintain and improve the services we deliver - is also tracking well compared to the previous year. As part of this programme of work, we have taken a fresh look at some 'big ticket' capital projects, including wastewater and stormwater projects in Matatā and stormwater improvements in Edgecumbe.

Our focus is to ensure that every project we are planning will provide the most appropriate and affordable solution. Those reviews resulted in decisions not to proceed with several projects and to instead look for more affordable solutions.

INNOVATION RESOLVES WASTEWATER PROBLEM

A longstanding wastewater overflow problem in Whakatāne's CBD area has been resolved by an innovative engineering solution designed by Opus International Consultants.

Whakatāne District Council Infrastructure General Manager Tomasz Krawczyk says overflows caused by stormwater infiltration into the wastewater system during periods of heavy rain have been addressed by the installation of a new pressure main. "The main utilises the 40-metre fall from the Seaview Road lookout to push wastewater through the new system along George Street and Kakahoroa Drive to the McAlister Street pumping station," he explains.

The pressure main has a number of valves and controls which operate automatically during intense rainfall events to prevent overflows in the CBD. "A number of

conventional options were considered, including gravity systems and wastewater pumping stations, which would have involved a cost of well in excess of \$1 million," Mr Krawczyk says. "The Opus solution was not only completed within our budget of \$650,000, but with minimal disruption to businesses and motorists because the majority of the system was installed by directional drilling."

Opus Whakatāne Business Manager Grant Cox says the need to meet strict cost guidelines and avoid disruption to CBD businesses led the company to explore a range of fresh approaches. "As a result, we came up with an elegant and effective solution which is another good example of the value Opus International Consultants has been able to provide for the Whakatāne District and its ratepayers."

Three popular exhibitions at Te Kōputu a te whanga a Toi – the Whakatāne Library and Exhibition Centre – are drawing to a close.

Nigel Brown – Short Lives of Birds in the Sheaff Family Gallery finishes at 2.00pm this Sunday (4 November); Mandy Hague – Ex Ovo (Whakatāne Community Board Gallery) and the Molly Morpeth Canaday 3D Sculpture Award (Opus Gallery) both end on Sunday, 18 November.

CAMPAIGN TO END VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

The White Ribbon Campaign will launch throughout New Zealand this week, with Eastern Bay of Plenty Mayors joining others throughout the country in endorsing this community initiative to end men's violence against women.

On average in New Zealand, 14 women die and more than 3,500 men are convicted for assaults on women every year. Whakatāne Mayor Tony Bonne says the figures are both sad and frightening.

"These women are our mothers, daughters, sisters, and colleagues. As a community, we must take responsibility to end this violence, and that's why I and many other mayors throughout New Zealand are putting our names on the White Ribbon pledge," he says.

"While a signature might not seem to make a difference, we're making the statement that we absolutely do not tolerate violence towards women in our communities."

The White Ribbon Pledge is one of a number of initiatives organised by the Families Commission-led White Ribbon Campaign. The pledge brings together New Zealanders throughout the country in a united show of support to end violence against women. As
