Get into the festive spirit and you could be in to win in the 2014 Whakatāne Christmas Light Trail Competition.


To enter, it's as simple as decorating your home with Christmas lights and completing the entry form which you will find in this issue of the Bay Weekend.

Energy Trust funds community projects

The Eastern Bay Energy Trust (EBET) has announced funding for four energy-related community projects in the Whakatāne District

Earlier this year EBET approved funding of \$65,000 for the electrical supply, wiring, exterior lighting and conduits for The Strand pedestrian plaza development, and the Trust has granted \$35,000 towards the cost of installing Christmas and feature lighting, including additional tree bud-lighting on The Strand. Then last month, a grant of \$70,000-plus was made towards the upgrading and expansion of Whakatāne's CCTV network, and a further \$75,000 grant was approved for the construction of a new shared-use community hall at the Murupara Area School.

Councillor Andrew Iles, Projects and Services Committee Chairman, says the funding provided by EBET makes a massive contribution to the region. "The Council is hugely appreciative of the grants, which have allowed us to undertake projects which may otherwise have had to be scaled down, delayed or even set aside."

Galatea-Murupara Ward Councillor Alison Silcock says EBET funding for the planned Murupara hall will open up opportunities for our students and the entire community.

Toi's track Tree removal for Wainui Road maintenance

Tree removal is underway on Wainui Road, from Tauwhare Pā through to Te Kooti Road. The work is part of a wider project which aims to improve road safety, including road widening, the installation of guard rails, additional line marking and skid resistance monitoring. A temporary speed reduction will be in place on a section of Wainui Road over the summer, but no permanent reduction is envisioned at this stage.

The completion of the tree removal programme, from Te Kooti Road through to the District boundary (near Stanley Road), is expected by mid-February 2015.

The exhibitions run until 18 January, after which the galleries will prepare for the 2015 Molly Morpeth Canaday Art Award, which opens with a ticketed award ceremony on the evening of Friday, 23 January.

COUNCILLOR PROFILE - Scott Jarrett

Third-term Whakatāne-Ōhope Ward Councillor Scott Jarrett is Deputy Chair of the Policy Committee, a member of the Projects and Services Committee, and serves on the Eastern Bay Joint Committee and Grow Whakatāne Advisory Board. He is also a Council appointee to the Whakatāne Museum Board and to Arts Whakatāne, which is a reflection of his longterm involvement in the local arts scene.

"I believe good infrastructure and services must come first, but I also value the importance of our surrounding and highly productive rural community, as well as our developing light industry sector," he says.

Councillor Jarrett has been vocal in his support for initiatives that help to increase the District's rating base and that provide job opportunities for local people. "I believe the road ahead is about attracting a few more folk into our area, without spoiling our special part of the world

"During my time on council, I have seen a variety of council and management 'models', but the pathway in this triennium would have to be the most balanced I have experienced in my local politics journey. I would suggest steady as she goes as a sound way forward, given the affordability constraints we have."
