Your Whakatāne District Council Community Update - October 2015

Gorge Road work nearing completion

Work on the new walking path and cycleway on Gorge Road in Whakatāne is nearing completion. Whakatāne District Council Manager Transportation, Martin Taylor, says the project has been a major undertaking and the contractor has done an excellent job, overcoming some very challenging aspects of the project.

"Waiotahi Contractors has had to construct some very sizable retaining walls to accommodate the wider pathway, which has been the major factor in the time taken to complete the work," Mr Taylor says. "But we are now nearing completion and I think the public will be very pleased with the outcome. A lot of people use this route, which will now be considerably safer and easier for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists."

Wainui Road works underway

The long-awaited Cheddar Valley Route Security works on Wainui Road are now underway and, weather conditions permitting, are expected to be completed by Labour weekend.

High river levels at the gravel extraction site have affected the contractor's ability to supply river gravel for the project, and wet weather could also cause delays. However, it's hoped that the work to raise the road surface above the flood level in the 'S-bends' area will be completed and the road resealed before the long weekend.

The work is being carried out by Waiotahi Contractors, from the company's Ōpōtiki depot, at a total cost of \$450,000.

Sister Cities scholarship awarded

Each year the Whakatāne District

Sister Cities Committee offers a scholarship to Year 12 or 13 students of Japanese to provide opportunities for the youth of the District to experience Japanese culture in a supportive environment.

This year's recipient is Raeana Araroa from Trident High School. She will travel to Japan in January 2016 and spend a week home-staying in Kamagaya, Whakatāne's Sister City, before travelling around Japan

for a further week. While in Kamagaya, Raeana will represent Whakatāne, promoting our region and District. She will receive \$1,500 towards her air travel as part of the generous scholarship from the Committee. Last year's recipient, Mark Oxtoby, was unable to take up his scholarship and will be accompanying Raeana this year.

Whakatāne District Councillor Andrew Iles, Chair of the Sister Cities Committee, says this is a fantastic opportunity for the students. "Raeana and Mark are confident and well-presented teenagers who I am sure will greatly benefit from experiencing a rich cultural and language exchange with their host families. At the same time, they will be excellent ambassadors for our District and help to build ties between our two cities."



Pensioner Housing units sale now completed

Ownership of the Whakatāne District Council's 79 pensioner housing units has now been transferred to Tawanui Community Housing (TCHT). All existing tenancy arrangements have continued under the same terms and conditions.

The intention to sell the units was confirmed through the Council's 2015-25 Long Term Plan, following an earlier community consultation process and direct communication with tenants and other stakeholders. Mayor Tony Bonne says the need to protect the interests of existing and future tenants was a key factor in the decision to sell.

"Council's first priority was to ensure that this important community resource is safeguarded so that it can continue to provide affordable, good quality social housing into the future," he says. "Government policy means that local authorities do not have access to social housing grants and subsidies and, importantly, that our tenants do not have access to income-related rental subsidies. Approved community housing providers do have that access and by transferring ownership to TCHT, we can ensure that our pensioner housing assets will be well-maintained and developed as required to meet the community's future needs."

The agreement to sell follows an extensive evaluation process. Mayor Bonne says that while the purchase price of \$2.5 million is less than the estimated market value of the units, this simply reflects the impact of the undertakings sought by the Council. "From the outset, it was recognised that the conditions we required to protect the community's interests would affect the value of the pensioner units. But this was never about money and the agreement has been structured to ensure that TCHT can continue to invest in this important service."

ALERTING SYSTEMS TEST NO ACTION REGUIRED

Emergency Management Bay of Plenty is advising the public that it will be testing all available alerting systems, including sirens, at 10am on Friday, 9 October. All fixed sirens will sound continuously for up to one minute in Matatā, Coastlands, Whakatāne, Ohiwa, Waiotahi, Ōpōtiki and Waihau Bay. Text alerts and emails will

also be sent.

The test is being undertaken to ensure that all of the alerting systems are operating effectively, and no action is required on residents' behalves. Only a limited number of registrations will be available on the day, so residents wanting to take part are urged to register early. The Colour Rush starts at 11am at the Whakatāne Rose Gardens on McGarvey Road and costs \$18 per entrant, or \$50 for a family, with a t-shirt provided for each entrant.
