Your Whakatāne District Council Community Update - March 2015



New platform for Wharf

Swimmers at the Port Ohope wharf now have a purpose-built platform to launch themselves from. The platform came about via a joint initiative between Whakatane District Council and the Bay of Plenty Regional Council, following some grass-roots consultation with children and parents who frequented the wharf. Pete Cavanagh, Harbour Superintendent for the Whakatāne District Council, says the platform was approved by the Council's engineer and was kept as simple as possible, as per the requests of the young - but experienced - wharf jumpers.

Long Term Plan approved for community consultation



The Whakatāne District Council is in the process of developing the 2015-25 Long Term Plan (LTP), and we're keen to know what you think about our proposals.

A consultation document, 'The Big Decisions', will be distributed throughout the District during the week beginning 16 March. Mayor Tony Bonne says he encourages all community members to read the document and provide feedback to the Council.

"The final LTP will set out the direction, priorities, work programme and budgets the Council is proposing to implement during the next decade, so it's hugely important that we get a feel for whether the wider community believes we are heading in the right direction," he says. "For the most part, we are proposing a 'steady as you go' approach, with a focus on delivering reliable services and infrastructure at an affordable cost. However, we are looking to make progress in some carefully selected areas, such as investing in activities which will contribute to growth and community prosperity."

The LTP Consultation Document and a number of supporting documents will be available on the Council website (www.whakatane.govt.nz) from 12 March, with copies also available from Council offices and District libraries. The submission period runs from 12 March to 13 April 2015, with hearings and deliberations scheduled to be held between 7 and 22 May. The LTP and associated documents will then be finalised and adopted on 25 June.
















Sport NZ Rural Travel funding

THE (ROAD SAFETY) Message Is *In The Music*



Although first released almost five decades ago, Roadhouse Blues the smash hit from legendary 1960s rockers The Doors – carries a timeless message that can still save lives.

Heralded by a contagiously memorable heavy blues riff, the lyrics (Keep your eyes on the road and your

hands upon the wheel) serve as a stark reminder of where your focus needs to be when you take the driver's seat.

And it's a message that is particularly pertinent here in the Eastern Bay of Plenty. The NZ Transport Agency's 'Communities at Risk register' ranks the Ōpōtiki,

Study favours stream re-grading and deepening

An investigation of possible flood mitigation options for the Wainui Te Whara Stream in Whakatane has indicated that channel re-grading and deepening is likely to be the fastest and most cost-effective way to reduce the risk of future stopbank overtopping.

The joint Bay of Plenty Regional Council/ Whakatāne District Council study was undertaken utilising the Bay of Plenty Flood Risk Framework and involved an extensive analysis of the stream's behaviour during extreme weather events and an 'all-ofcatchment' approach to risk reduction.

Council Infrastructure General Manager, Tomasz Krawczyk, says detailed engineering investigations are now being undertaken to confirm the viability of deepening and re-grading the channel.

"Our modelling indicates that a capacity flow of around 30 cubic metres per second can be achieved at an estimated cost of between \$1.5 million and \$1.8 million," he says. "With additional mitigation measures in the upper catchment to complement the increased downstream capacity, we believe that

channel re-grading is the best way to contain flood flows such as that experienced during last Easter's extreme rainfall event."

The proposed work would see the channel grade improved between the Valley Road bridge and the western side of the King Street bridge – a distance of about 1.3 kilometres – and the channel deepened by about one metre in places. That would require the removal of some 4,000 cubic metres of soil and rock.

Water Conservation/Restrictions

The water restrictions status for Whakatāne and Ōhope consumers remains at 'Level one' – voluntary conservation, although that could change in a matter of days. If the Whakatāne River flow rate falls below 10 cubic metres per second, it's likely that hose and sprinkler restrictions would be introduced without delay.

Earlier this week the river flow had fallen from about 18m³/second to less than 13m³/second. The river flow is directly related to how far upriver salinity

reaches around high tides. At lower flows, salinity is an almost constant factor at the water treatment station intake, requiring the operating staff to source much of the raw water volume required from an emergency uptake one kilometre upstream.

When that occurs, water restrictions are required to ensure that reservoir storage can be maintained at a level which caters for both consumer demand, and any emergency firefighting needs.
