Call for water conservation

Water conservation signs have been erected at key locations in Whakatāne and Ohope to remind residents of the need to conserve water as the long, hot summer continues. While recent rain has helped to reduce demand and brought a welcome but minor increase in the Whakatāne River flow, the benefit is likely to be short-lived if we don't get more significant rain over the next week or two.

Whakatāne District Council Infrastructure General Manager Tomasz Krawczyk says voluntary reductions may help to avoid the need for formal restrictions on hose and sprinkler use by ensuring that reservoir storage for the Whakatane and Ohope water supply schemes stays at an acceptable level.

"We hope that restrictions can be avoided, but that's entirely dependent on the river flow and tidal situation and the ability of households and businesses to make voluntary reductions in their water usage," Mr Krawczyk says.

Demand in the Plains water supply area is also affecting water pressure during the morning and afternoon peak periods – 7am - 10am and 3.30pm - 7pm - and Plains consumers are asked to conserve water wherever possible, particularly in those peak demand times. One simple way of adjusting the demand timing is for users to turn off the supply to their header tanks during the day and turn the tap back on in the evening, so that tanks refill overnight.

OTHER SIMPLE CONSERVATION TIPS INCLUDE:

- Bucket-wash cars or boats, if possible
- Don't refill or top-up swimming pools
- If you know you have leaking taps, fix them now
- Flush toilets sparingly
- Don't use your bath and cut your shower time down as much as possible
- While waiting for hot water to flow through to showers or taps, catch the unused water in a bucket for use in washing machines or for other purposes.

Mayor Tony Bonne said the wider pathway would address safety concerns for cyclists and pedestrians using Gorge Road. "The existing footpath is not ideal, given the number of pedestrians and cyclists who regularly use it, and this additional funding will allow us to more than double the pathway width over most of the 1.25km route," he said.

Whakatāne District residents who are concerned about floodwater damaging their properties during heavy rain events can now purchase sandbagging materials from local business Tracks Concrete.

Sandbags are an effective way of diverting floodwater and reducing property damage, and MetService severe weather warnings providing useful information for people to act on can be subscribed to on the Metservice website www.metservice.com.

Whakatāne Emergency Response Team Manager Tony Gillard has welcomed the initiative and says it will let volunteers focus on "assisting the Fire Service to pump water away from flooded properties, protect key lifeline infrastructure, and carry out evacuations".

Sandbags can be purchased from Tracks Concrete from 9am – 5pm Monday to Friday, and 9am – 12pm on Saturdays. Tracks will open their yard outside these hours to provide an emergency service, but in such situations delays are critical, so people are advised to plan ahead and take action in advance.
