#### **Budget changes likely** for coming year

The Whakatāne District Council's draft budget for the 2019/20 financial year proposes a number of changes from the work programme and budget previously set out for the year in the 2018-28 Long Term Plan (LTP).

Committee chairperson, Deputy Mayor Judy Turner, says the proposed changes have been driven by a number of significant challenges and opportunities which have evolved since the LTP was adopted last year.

"The key aspect from the community's perspective is that the average rates increase for the year across the district is likely to be around 4.16 percent," she says. "While that is within the limit the LTP provides for, it is higher than the 2.88 percent increase predicted for the year - and higher than Councillors would like.

"However, we have to recognise that there are drivers for change which we need to respond to, many of which offer opportunities to progress some exciting community priorities."

The draft budget will be tabled at the next Council meeting on 6 March where elected members will discuss the revised work programme, recognising that there would be implications for the rating and debt measures indicated in the LTP. The scale of changes to the LTP would guide Councillors in whether they would seek input from community members through a consultation process.

"Residents have been asking for public bins to match our kerbside collection system, so we're pleased to be offering this system and hope to see some positive results through reduced landfill waste volumes," Mr Clarke says. "This is a great opportunity to change our behaviour around rubbish and recycling, and have a positive impact on our natural environment."

#### **Subsidised Home Composting Scheme**

You may have heard about a new Council initiative to subsidise home composting solutions for households in our District. We've received a lot of interest since this was announced, so here's the lowdown..

The compost bins and worm farms will be available, on a first-come, firstserved basis, from 26 March at the Whakatāne Civic Centre on Tuesday mornings from 9am to 12pm and Wednesday afternoons from 1pm to 4pm. They'll also be available from the Murupara Service Centre from the same date.

The composting systems will cost \$10 each and anyone wanting to purchase one will be required to provide a name and address, as they are limited to one per property.

#### **Colour-coded recycling bins** come to Whakatāne streets

A recycling trial will begin this month in Whakatāne, with the aim of reducing the amount of waste going to landfill from public places.

The new concept bins involved will incorporate features to make it easier for people to separate recyclable items from general waste, including nationally consistent bin colours, clear signage in English and te reo Māori, and WiFi technology to reduce overflow and make collections more efficient.

As part of the trial, existing rubbish bins in the vicinity of the new stations will be covered over, and have messaging to direct people to the nearest recycling station. The recycling stations will each have four bins - two red bins for general rubbish (including food scraps, coffee cups and plastic wrappers); one yellow bin (for paper, plastic bottles and aluminium cans); and one blue bin (for
