Home composting scheme uptake overwhelming

Council recently provided a selection of highly-subsidised home composting and worm farm equipment to residents with an overwhelming response. The Subsidised Home Composting Scheme was possible thanks to the Ministry for the Environment's Waste Levy Funding to councils. Changes to plastic recycling on the way

Whakatāne District Council's kerbside recycling service will soon stop accepting grades 3 to 7 plastics as a result of significant changes to the global recycling market.

Residents will have stickers delivered to their households later this month, which should be placed on the yellow-lid bins as a reminder that only grade 1 and 2 plastics will be accepted. Grades 3 to 7 plastics include widely-used items such as ice cream containers, yoghurt pots and takeaway containers.

Waste Management NZ Ltd, the local contractor for rubbish and recycling, began rejecting these grades from commercial customers at the end of last year. In the coming months they will no longer be accepting them from household kerbside collections either.

A key factor in this change is China's decision to stop importing 24 grades of waste, including household plastics and mixed paper. Since then New Zealand has been sending plastic waste to South East Asia, but now Malaysia is also banning imports of many plastic grades.

Whakatāne District Council Solid Waste Manager, Nigel Clarke says some councils are stockpiling these plastics while they look into other options, but the most sustainable way forward is a change in consumer habits.

"People can stop these plastics ending up in landfill by choosing not to buy them in the first place," he says. "The type of packaging a product comes in should be a factor in purchase decisions – check the grade of plastic first to identify whether it can be recycled. If it can't, try to choose an alternative.'



Time is running out to get your application in for funding your creative project. The Creative Communities Whakatāne Scheme is aimed at increasing participation in the arts at a local level and increasing the range and diversity of arts available within communities. All artists or art-related organisations are eligible to apply, either as individuals or groups. The Scheme offers support for a variety of art-based projects, and all applications are assessed on the merit of the project and how it fits within the Creative NZ Communities Scheme criteria.

All applications are required to outline the benefits of the proposed project to the community, as this is the basis for receiving the fund from Creative NZ. The three categories are Participation, Diversity, and Young People. More information on these categories as well as how to apply can be found on the Whakatāne District Council website. There is \$15,000 available to allocate to projects, so get your application in by 5pm Friday, 10 May 2019.

DO YOU CARE ABOUT YOUR COMMUNITY? Consider standing for election

The local body election to select the District's Mayor, Councillors and Community Board Members is to be held this year. These are the people who will make the final decisions about how we develop our community, how we set and spend our rates, and where we should be focusing our efforts for the future.

You may be interested in standing for Council and becoming one of those decisionmakers for our District. If so, nominations for candidates will open on 19 July and close on 16 August, along with the electoral roll. After this date, anyone who is entitled to vote and who is not enrolled as an elector, or whose details are incorrectly recorded on the roll, will have to cast a 'special vote'.

Local elections for city and district councils, regional councils and district health boards will be held from 20 September to 12 October this year.

In order to receive a voting paper, you must be enrolled on the electoral roll at your current address. So, if you are new to the area, have recently changed address, have just turned 18, or never been on the roll - go to elections.org.nz or your nearest Post Shop to enrol.



Shared use path widening and redirection works underway

Work has commenced this week to widen and redirect the shareduse riverside path on the eastern end of the Warren Cole Walkway. to take users around the safety-sensitive game wharf and boat trailer parking areas.

The existing path will be widened and rerouted from the top of the stop bank past the southern (town) side of the waka shed and back on to the shared-use path on Muriwai Drive. This work is being carried out for public safety reasons, to provide a safe route for pedestrians and cyclists to and from the Whakatane Heads.

The new path will be constructed in concrete and will be three metres wide. Where the path rises over the stop bank, it will be paved with recycled paving blocks, to tie into the existing path and allow for a possible future raising of the stop bank, for flood protection reasons.

As part of the works, the existing path between the waka shed and the wharf and boat trailer park will be reinstated as a grassed area.

While the works have been programmed to cause minimal disruption, Mataatua Reserve may be closed to overflow boat trailer parking for a short period.

The path works will be carried out by contractors, Crossroads, and are expected to be completed by 30 May 2019. A cultural monitor will be onsite to oversee the works.
