

#### FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR SPORTS TEAMS

### Climate Change reports show great progress

The first round of Whakatāne District Council's climate change project reporting shows excellent progress has been made on some of the targets and actions adopted last year.

One major project success is the prioritisation of heat pump use at the Whakatāne Aquatic and Fitness Centre, replacing natural gas boilers. The new approach has contributed towards the 40 percent reduction in Council's total natural gas use compared with the baseline from 2017-18.

Councillor Julie Jukes, Organisational Performance Committee Chair, says it is rewarding to see this type of reporting, as it highlights which actions are completed, those that are progressing well, and those that have yet to be started.

"It provides a clear snapshot of all current Council activities, and raises the question of what else needs to be done long-term to reach our goals and targets, such as becoming a carbon zero organisation by
