



Five big things we need to talk about



our water supply, sewerage and stormwater services

A lot of our water infrastructure was built in the mid-1900s. While there has been ongoing maintenance and some upgrades over the years. many parts of the network are coming to the end of their useful lives and need to be replaced. Investment is overdue and absolutely necessary.

We're signaling the need to spend \$1.37 billion to renew, improve, expand and maintain our water supply, sewerage and stormwater services during the coming 30 years



Responding to demand for active transport and road sealing

We often hear that people in our communities want better walking, cycling and active transport networks in the Whakatāne District. We also know people have concerns about health and safety issues on unsealed roads.

The draft Long Term Plan includes changes to the transport programme to accelerate some of these things, including implementing the Active Whakatāne District-Wide Transport and Recreation Strategy and reintroducing funding for road sealing.


