Taonga returns

A kahu huruhuru (feathered cloak) was received at a pohiri at Te Whare Taonga ō Taketake in March, ahead of the Rua Kēnana Symposium that was held at Tuapou Marae in Matahī Valley last weekend.

The taonga (treasure) is more than 100-years old and was worn by Ngaiwai Whakaataata, the daughter of Tuhoe prophet Rua Kenana. Staff at Te Whare Taonga ō Taketake assisted with the transfer of the kahu huruhuru from Te Papa Tongarewa.

\$300K FOR COMMUNITY GOOD

We've secured more than \$300,000 from the Lions Foundation to fund 'community good' projects around the district.

Projects include installing disability hoists at the Whakatāne Aquatic Centre and Murupara Community Pool; replacing the basketball court surface in Murupara; upgrading the playgrounds in Te Mahoe and Awatapu; installing shade sails at playgrounds in Murupara, Tāneatua, Matatā and Thornton; and adding accessible toilets at the River Edge Park facility near the Whakatāne Skate Park.

The McAlister Street water main, from Domain Road to Beach Street, will be replaced, having reached the end of its 'scheduled' life. Aging water pipes are more at risk of major breaks, which carry the risk of contamination, damage to other infrastructure and properties, as well as the problems associated with interruption of supply to the community and businesses.

Council is investing \$1.2m to replace this critical water main that supplies water to over 200 properties and numerous businesses. The upgrade also includes all valves, hydrants, fittings, service lines and water meters. Council and lead contractor Draintech have been sharing information with affected residents and businesses ahead of the work starting from the Beach Street end in the next couple of weeks.

This renewal project will help ensure a reliable and safe water supply to meet the needs of our growing town centre for the next 60 years.

No more cheque payments

Banks are phasing out cheques this year. This means Whakatāne District Council will stop accepting cheques as a payment method after Friday, 21 May 2021.
