AWATARARIKI FANHEAD

Independent commissioners released their decisions supporting two proposed plan changes aimed at avoiding loss of life on the Awatarariki fanhead in Matatā from a future debris flow event.

One appeal to both decisions was lodged with the Environment Court and a hearing has been scheduled to start on 7 December 2020.



KĀHUI AWATARARIKI

A reference group, called Kāhui Awatarariki, will be formed to create a final design plan for acquired land in the Awatarariki Fanhead.

The group will include key stakeholders, including iwi, and members of the wider Matatā community.

FIXED ALERT SIRENS DECOMMISSIONED

Whakatāne and Ōpōtiki District Councils will no longer use fixed alert sirens for tsunami warning and will rely on a range of other alerting tools including Emergency Mobile Alerts (EMA), radio, stinger sirens and internet-based systems.

Whakatāne District Council Chief Executive, Steph O'Sullivan, said that it was a carefully-considered decision of both Whakatāne and Ōpōtiki District Council that weighed the very high cost of replacement sirens and the frequent issues and misunderstandings of the system.

A reminder that good community spirit is the best way to prepare – please check on neighbours, call older family members and have a whānau plan for emergency situations.
