MURUPARA WATER TREATMENT UPDATE



The Murupara town water supply system was dosed with a one-off shock dose of hypochloride on Tuesday, 2 February to reduce the level of coliforms (bacteria). Sample results following this dosing suggest that the chlorine was used up by the contaminant and the levels returned to within the acceptable range.

Whakatāne District Council staff are also working with iwi representatives and the Ministry of Health to make sure the Minginui water supply is safe, following several 'boil water' notices this year.

Wahine Hauora programme a success

The Murupara Medical Centre team, led by Dr Britta Noske, recently held a series of Wāhine Hauora Days in Minginui, Ruatāhuna and Murupara. A hui was held to discuss how to best take the service to people in remote communities that have limited access to health services.

In a collaboration between Murupara Medical Centre, Te Ika Whenua Hauora, Ngāti Whare, Hinepukohurangi Trust, Eastbay REAP, Support to Screening Service providers, Family Planning and Lakes DHB, with support from the National Cervical Screening Programme (NCSP) and Cancer Society, approximately 150 wāhine were screened over three days.

Dr Noske says it was a great result for the community, by the community.
