

Be a tourist in your own backyard

Plan an overnight stay in Whakatāne next month and take the kids on a night time adventure in wild kiwi territory. From Thursday 8 April, Whakatāne Kiwi Trust host guided night walks



every week in the Ōhope Scenic Reserve and Mokorua Bush Scenic Reserve where over 300 wild kiwi reside.

Learn about the local kiwi population and the work being done by Whakatāne Kiwi Trust to protect our national icon and other native taonga. While listening for kiwi, ruru and weka calling, you'll also discover other fascinating creatures that come out from hiding after dark including cave wētā, giant spiders, glow worms and giant kōkopu.

The Kids Night Walk of Discovery is suitable for children aged between 5 and 8, and other night walks are available for adults and children over 8. Adults \$23, kids \$10.25 or book a family pass for \$54.25.

Mōteatea workshops a hit with the community

The Murupara Library and Service Centre is hosting a series of workshops to celebrate traditional mōteatea (traditional chants) unique to local iwi, Ngāti Manawa. With the expertise of Te Waimatao Murphy and



Huia Huriwaka, who are passionate about sharing their knowledge on Ngāti Manawatanga, the seven-week journey includes learning five unique mōteatea. This is a free community event held on Tuesday evenings from 5pm to 6pm. The first session took place on Tuesday, 16 February.

MURUPARA POLICE REPORT

Kia ora koutou, ngā mihi o te tau hou.

During the Christmas period there was an increase in alcohol-related vehicle crashes and driver offences. This highlights the importance of education around alcohol and driving, and the risk to the community.

There have also been more rural and farm burglaries, including several quad bikes and utes stolen from unsecure properties. These vehicles are often unregistered with no serial numbers, which makes it difficult for our teams to recover them for the owners. Once again, please think about the importance of home security and make a note of vehicle identification details, such as serial numbers, and other identifying things like photos. If you'd like more tips on how to keep your belongings safe, please come to the local station for a chat.

Youth offending continues to be a problem in the community, with vehicles found in the Murupara township and forest areas that have been stolen from around the wider district. We'd really like the support of the community to identify those responsible, and work positively with whānau to educate our youth and hold them accountable.

We're working on lots of positive projects with our local community groups, and I'll be able to give an update once they are in place.

Books celebrate womanhood

In support of International Women's Day on 8 March, Murupara Library and Service Centre staff want to highlight two books that have recently been added to the library collection.



Author, Ngahuia Murphy, is a descendant of Ngāti Manawa, Ngāti Ruapani, Tūhoe and Ngāti Kahungunu.

Her research into menstruation has opened the doors to explore ways of reclaiming knowledge around ceremonial traditions that celebrate womanhood, and her books are a commemoration of Mātauranga Māori. Both books have been published by He Puna Manawa Ltd and are now part of the permanent collection of the Murupara Library. Huge thanks to Te Waimatao Murphy, who kindly donated these books to our community.
