1. Reason for the report - Te Take mō tēnei rīpoata

That the Committee considers the applications received for the 'Reorua Contestable Fund - March 2025' and allocates funding to the recipients accordingly.

Applications opened on 10 February and closed on 2 March 2025. There is \$14,394.00 available for this round of the Reorua Contestable Fund. A total of seven valid applications were received requesting a total of \$14,254.80.

Five applicants have indicated they would like to address the Funding Committee about their application.

A summary of the valid applications is appended to the report.

2. Recommendations - Tohutohu akiaki

- 1. THAT the Community Funding Committee **receives** the report Reorua Contestable Fund March 2025; and
- 2. THAT the Community Funding Committee **receives** the applications to the Reorua Contestable Fund March 2025; and
- 3. THAT the Community Funding Committee **considers** the applications to the Reorua Contestable Fund March 2025 and **allocates** the funding to recipients accordingly.

3. Background - He tirohanga whakamuri

Whakatāne and Murupara are designated Reorua areas as part of a partnership between Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Awa, Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Manawa and Whakatāne District Council.

The Reorua initiative is supported by Aotearoa Reorua, which is a national movement that assists towns and cities across New Zealand to become bilingual centres.

Iwi partners and Councils work together to develop a bilingual strategy for their areas to create more spaces, places, and opportunities where Te Reo Māori is seen, heard, and celebrated alongside the English language.

6.1 Reorua Contestable Fund – March 2025(Cont.)

Community Funding Committee - AGENDA

Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Awa (TRONA), Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Manawa (TRONM), and Whakatāne District Council leadership teams with the support of Department of Internal Affairs collaboratively established Whakatāne and Murupara as Reorua townships. Together, these organisations recognise Reorua as a powerful platform for advancing Te Reo Māori revitalisation efforts within the towns and encompassing the whole rohe (boundaries) of the district.

The name of this fund was altered, from the Reorua ki Whakatāne Fund, to the Reorua Contestable Fund, to avoid confusion about applicant eligibility.

The Reorua Contestable Fund was developed through this partnership to support bilingual events and activities that help meet the Reorua Contestable Fund goals.

Ko tōku reo tōku ohooho, ko tōku reo tōku māpihi maurea.

My language is my awakening, my language is my treasure.

4. Discussion – Kōrerorero

All applications are assessed according to the merit of the project, based on guidelines developed through consultation between Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Awa and Whakatāne District Council.

All applications, whether from businesses, community groups or individuals are asked to identify the benefits of the proposed project to the community and must align with the strategic priorities and goals for the Reorua Contestable Fund:

- To improve understanding and use of Te Reo Māori in our communities
- To make Te Reo Māori seen, heard, felt, spoken and valued throughout the Whakatāne District
- To develop resources and programmes that revitalise, and encourage, the use of Te Reo Māori all around the Whakatāne District
- To increase opportunities for people to engage with and learn Te Reo Māori.

No options have been identified relating to the matters of this report.

6. Significance and Engagement Assessment - Aromatawai Pāhekoheko

6.1. Assessment of Significance

The decisions and matters of this report are assessed to be of low significance, in accordance with the Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.

6.2. Engagement and Community Views

The Reorua Contestable Fund is now into its third funding round, and as such, is becoming well established as a key grant funding round managed as part of Whakatāne District Council's funding portfolio. This portfolio includes a mix of Council-funded grants, externally funded grants and partnership funds.

The fund was discussed as part of the development of the updated Community Grants and Funding Policy and the 2024-34 Long Term Plan, both of which processes were engaged on extensively.

The latest Reorua fund was advertised externally through various media outlets including the local newspaper, community news, social media, radio and included direct mail to over 500 Council contacts and networks.

Engagement on this matter is not being undertaken in accordance with Section 6.1 of Council's Significance and Engagement Policy, subsections (b) and (e):

- (b) Council will not consult when there is already a sound understanding of the views and preferences of the persons likely to be affected or interested in the matter.
- (e) The matter has already been addressed by the Council's policies or plans, which have previously been consulted on.

7. Considerations - Whai Whakaaro

No inconsistencies with any of the Council's policies or plans have been identified in relation to this report.

7.1. Legal

No outstanding legislative requirements or obligations have been identified in relation to this report. The Local Government Act 2002 (LGA) mandates councils to uphold the Crown's responsibilities by considering Treaty of Waitangi principles and facilitating Māori participation in local decision-making.

7.2. Financial/Budget Considerations

The budget allocation for this fund has been provided by Māori Strategic Partnerships through the LTP bid. There are no outstanding budget considerations associated with the recommendations of this report. There is an administrative cost to Council (largely staff time) from members of the Māori Strategic Partnerships team, Governance and the Community Partnerships team, and also from external funding panel members.

7.3. Climate Change Assessment

There are no significant or notable impacts associated with the matters of this report. However, the very nature of the Reorua Contestable Fund is to encourage communication within key communities within our district. This is likely over time to enhance Goal 1 of the Climate Change Strategy:

• We all understand and can act on climate change and its impacts.

It is expected projects and activities supported through the Reorua Contestable Fund could have a positive impact on this goal in the medium to long term. However, the significance of this is likely to be low.

7.4. Risks

The only risk identified for this process is the potential for some members of the public to feel that the funds being distributed are not being used in the best way possible, or that the goals of Aotearoa Reorua are not supported by all.

Applications opened on 10 February and closed on 2 March 2025. There is \$38,455.00 in total available for the Te Puaha Scholarship Fund and the Te Puaha General Fund. One valid application was received for scholarship funding requesting a total of \$5000.00

3. Background - He tirohanga whakamuri

The Te Puaha Scholarship Fund is open to individuals who are involved in, or would like to be involved in, activities and projects linked to the Whakatāne District's waterways and marine environment.

This fund is for anyone interested in water-related activities, and who wants to improve their education, personal development, training, skills or experience.

The scholarship is valid for study, research, training or related activities that take place in and/or benefit the Whakatāne District. Council is keen to support activities that have the potential to develop future leaders that will be champions for marine, waterways and coastal environments.

The Te Puaha Scholarship Fund is linked to the Te Puaha General Fund and uses funding set aside for this purpose.

Applicants are encouraged to apply for grants up to \$5,000, although applications for amounts higher than this may be considered on a case-by-case basis.

1. Reason for the report - Te Take mō tēnei rīpoata

That the Committee considers the applications received for the first round of the Community Matching Fund for 2025 and allocates funding to the recipients accordingly.

Applications opened on 10 February and closed on 2 March, 2025. There is \$26,394.00 available for this round of the Community Matching Fund. A total of 23 valid applications were received requesting a total of \$141,489.89.

A summary of the valid applications is appended to the report.

2. Recommendation/s - Tohutohu akiaki

- 1. THAT the Community Funding Committee **receives** the report Community Matching Fund March 2025; and

3. Background - He tirohanga whakamuri

The Community Matching Fund is an initiative which supports not-for-profit organisations within the Whakatāne District that are working for the benefit of our communities.

How it works:

Organisations can apply for the dollar value of donations and contributions they have received from the community, and if successful, Whakatāne District Council will "match" these contributions with a grant. The arrangement is a 50/50 share. Council's share is a grant, and the organisation's share can be any combination of:

- Volunteer labour that has been donated by individuals (valued at \$23.50 per hour)
- Donated professional services valued at up to \$65/hour

- Equipment and materials donated to their organisation
- Funding, grants, and other monetary donations to their organisation.

Council will also consider other types of donations and contributions not listed here.

4. Discussion – Korerorero

The Community Matching Fund is intended to fund projects, programmes, and activities that benefit the Whakatāne District, its residents, and its communities. Applicants must be active in the Whakatāne District to be eligible.

In addition, preference will be given to fund applicants that:

- Have a clear plan in their application, identify exactly how funding will be used, and provide a budget for the project/activity
- Demonstrate that there is a community need and/or community support for the project or activity
- Support vulnerable and marginalised people and groups in our community
- Align with Whakatāne District Council's values.

The Community Matching Fund replaces the previous Annual Grant funding rounds. This change was signalled through the development of the updated Community Grants and Funding Policy and confirmed through the 2024-34 Long Term Plan, both of which processes were engaged on extensively.

The Community Matching Fund was advertised externally through various media outlets including the local newspaper, community newsletters, social media, radio and emails to over 550 Council contacts and networks.

Engagement on this matter is not being undertaken in accordance with Section 6.1 of Council's Significance and Engagement Policy, subsections (b) and (e):

- (b) Council will not consult when there is already a sound understanding of the views and preferences of the persons likely to be affected or interested in the matter.
- (e) The matter has already been addressed by the Council's policies or plans, which have previously been consulted on.

7.1. Strategic Alignment

No inconsistencies with any of Council's policies or plans have been identified in relation to this report.

7.2. Legal

7.3. Financial/Budget Considerations

The budget allocation for the Community Matching Fund was confirmed through the Long Term Plan.

There is an administrative cost to Council (largely staff time) from members of the Governance, Communications and Community Partnerships teams and advertising costs.

7.4. Climate Change Assessment

There are no significant or notable impacts associated with the matters of this report. However, the very nature of the Community Matching Fund is to encourage projects and activities that support and benefit the communities within Whakatāne District. This may include activities that promote or enhance the goals of our Climate Change Strategy:

- Goal 1: We all understand and can act on climate change and its impacts.
- Goal 2: We have prioritised a just transition to low emissions.
- Goal 3: We will continue to adapt, to reduce the effects of climate change

It is expected that projects and activities supported through the Community Matching Fund will have a positive impact on these goals in the medium to long term, however, the significance of this is likely to be low.
