


Key terms

Some terms:

- WDC: Whakatāne District Council
- BOPRC: Bay of Plenty Regional Council
- Elector: a person who is eligible to vote, and who is enrolled
- Electoral roll: list of electors, who are either on the Māori or general roll
- Māori Electoral Roll: a list of electors who are enrolled on the Māori roll
- · General Electoral Roll: a list of electors who are enrolled on the general roll



Key election dates





General electoral information

WDC:

- Population of around 39,000 people, and 26,600 electors
 - 18,600 electors on the general roll
 - 8,000 electors on the Māori roll
- FPP electoral system used
- Candidates listed in random order
- Elections held for BOPRC
- Māori ward poll for WDC



Whakatāne District Council

- 1 mayor
- 10 councillors:
 - 7 general ward councillors:
 - 2 from the Rangitāiki General Ward
 - 4 from the Whakatāne-Ōhope General Ward
 - 1 from the Te Urewera General Ward




Whakatāne District Council

- 3 Māori ward councillors:
 - 1 from the Rangitāiki Māori Ward
 - 1 from the Kāpū-te-rangi Māori Ward
 - 1 from the Toi ki Uta Māori Ward




Whakatāne District Council

- 24 community board members:
 - 6 from the Rangitāiki Community Board
 - 6 from the Whakatāne-Ōhope Community Board
 - 6 from the Tāneatua Community Board
 - 6 from the Murupara Community Board, being:
 - 2 from the Galatea-Waiōhau Subdivision
 - 3 from the Murupara Subdivision
 - 1 from the Te Urewera Subdivision




Bay of Plenty Regional Council

- 3 regional councillors from the WDC area:
 - 2 from the Eastern Bay of Plenty General Constituency
 - 1 from the Kōhi Māori Constituency




A poll will be held with 2025 elections, with two options:

- Vote to KEEP or REMOVE the Māori wards
- Poll is binding
- Outcome will apply for 2028 and 2031 elections
- Regardless of the outcome of the poll, the Māori wards will be in place for 2025-2028 term



Electoral system

- Both WDC and BOPRC are using the First Past the Post (FPP) electoral system
 - Vote by ticking candidate names
 - Candidates with highest number of votes wins
 - Don't vote for more candidates than the number of positions



Candidate eligibility

To be a candidate, you must be:

- A NZ citizen
- 18 or over
- Enrolled on the parliamentary roll in New Zealand
- Nominated by two people from area and roll standing
 - i.e. if you're standing for the Rangitāiki General Ward, your nomination must be signed by two people enrolled on the general roll in the Rangitāiki General Ward area
 - or, if you're standing for the Rangitāiki Māori Ward, your nomination must be signed by two people enrolled on the Māori roll in the Rangitāiki Māori Ward area




Candidate eligibility

- Can stand for multiple positions (mayor, council and community board)
 - If elected to more than one position, candidate take higher position
 - Can't stand for more than one ward
- Cannot stand for both WDC and BOPRC
- Elected members (or spouses) cannot have contracts with council over \$25,000 (incl GST) in one financial year
- If a council employee is elected to mayor or council, they must resign
- Can't nominate yourself




- First off obtain a copy of the candidate information handbook
- Download a PDF from council's website,
 or request a hardcopy
- Contains everything you need to know about being a candidate
 - Nomination criteria, election sign rules, campaigning guidelines etc



- Nominations open Friday 4 July
- Two ways to submit your nomination:
- 1. Online (easiest way) at <u>esp.electionservices.co.nz/lge2025/WK</u>
 - 2. Complete a hardcopy form and drop off in person (see handbook or council website for locations)





Online nominations portal:

- No printing, handwriting, scanning etc
- Enter your statement electronically
- Upload your photo
- Instantly confirm your nominators are eligible



Each nomination requires:

- \$200 (including GST) deposit (for each position standing for)
- 150-word candidate profile statement (English, Māori or both)
- Recent passport-size colour photo
- Evidence of NZ citizenship
- Candidates can declare an affiliation
 - Can be group, organisation or independent
 - Unacceptable affiliations (slogan, indecent, slanderous)



Required to include:

- Statement on principal place of residence
 - This automatic and not counted in your 150 words
- List any other positions you're standing for

- Nominations close 12 noon, 1 August
 - Sharp don't leave to last minute
 - What if you need to fix an issue? Will you have time?

1-4 general ward councillors

2 general constituency regional councillors



1-6 community board members

Campaigning

- Campaigning can occur anytime (from now)
- WDC has an election signs policy
 - Signs can go up 8 weeks before election day (16 August)
 - Must remove them by 3 days after election day (14 October)
 - Good idea to read the full policy at <u>www.whakatane.govt.nz</u>
- · All election advertisements must show contact details of authorising person
 - Signs, notices, pamphlets, webpages, vehicles etc
 - Excludes posts, tweets, messages just put it once on your main page





Campaigning

Social media great way to campaign

- Instant, far-reaching, free
- Promote yourself and policies state policies, run polls, encourage people to vote, key dates etc
- Fake news not acceptable

Council's media channels off-limits

- Must be politically neutral, monitored
- Cyber-security keep safe
- Computers can be hacked
- Be mindful of election offences



Donations

Yes, you can receive donations to spend on your campaign, noting:

- All donations must be recorded and declared after the election
- How much and who it came from, unless 'anonymous'
- 'Anonymous' donation can't be over \$1,500
- There's no limit on donations but there is a limit of how much you can spend



Campaign spend

How much can you spend on your campaign? Depends on which position you stand for

Position	Population*	Limit
Mayor	38,290	\$20,000
Rangitāiki General	6,960	\$7,000
Whakatāne-Ōhope General	14,750	\$14,000
Rangitāiki Community Board Whakatāne-Ōhope Community	10,200	\$14,000
Board	19,900	\$14,000
All other positions (wards and community boards)	Up to 4,999	\$3,500



Campaign spend

- Expenditure limits include GST
- Can't add limits together if campaigning for multiple seats
- Electoral expenses and donations return required by 11 December (enforced)
- Completed forms available for public inspection (7 years)
- Care to ensure accurate (declaration)



Voting

- Voting period 9 September to 12 noon, 11 October
- Voting packs delivered to electors 9 22 September
- Able to campaign up to and including election day
- Special votes available at certain locations check council website or handbook
- Candidates not to collect votes from electors
- Voters can post back their votes or hand-deliver to a council location
- Voting closes 12 noon, Saturday 11 October (sharp)



Voting

- During the voting period, a voting return schedule will be available on council's website
- Updated daily, so you can keep track of turnout



- All candidates contacted, media advised
- Preliminary results on Sunday (includes all votes counted except special votes)
- All results available on Council website
- Final results expected by Friday 17 October
- Take office day after public notice (18 October)
- Can act after sworn in at first meeting
