Whakatāne Local Growth Strategy

- A Local focus building on direction set in Spatial Plan.
- Unlock specific locations & opportunities.
- Further engage with Iwi/hapū partners, community & key stakeholders.
- Strategy to address the How, When, Who with of growth (including non-spatial elements).
- Incorporate priorities and activities already agreed in existing strategies & plans.

Why develop a Local Growth Strategy?


- Set out the District's strategic moves for growth, and related actions.

- Provide more certainty & confidence to others as they make their own planning & investment decisions in the District.




What's in it?

Succinct document that includes:


- 1. Growth story how District has grown/wants to grow.

What we've been doing since April



- Analysing existing council strategies, plans and policies.
- Reflecting on feedback from other engagement processes.
- Drawing on data, mapping and existing technical work (from other plans & strategies).
- Learning from other places growth and housing strategies.
- Having local conversations Iwi/hapū, key stakeholders, staff & Elected Members (ongoing).
- Developing a draft set of Strategic Moves, Potential Actions and Guiding Principles for the Local Growth Strategy.

Local Growth Strategy – 5 draft Strategic Moves

	Key Insight	Strategic Move
1.	The Town Centre and Kopeopeo are both essential to the region's growth and wellbeing, but their development potential is unrealised and they're poorly integrated.	Build a vibrant, more resilient and well- connected Town Centre and Kopeopeo mixed- use corridor.
2.	Greenfield development at scale is needed to provide adequate housing, but it's not currently enabled in resilient and market-feasible locations.	Unlock resilient and market-feasible greenfield opportunities.
3.	Iwi/hapū/whānau are often major landowners everywhere that is suitable for housing and development. Enabling their development aspirations is complex but critical.	Enable iwi, hāpu and whānau development aspirations.
4.	Western Bay of Plenty is an economic juggernaut with the attention of Central Government. Whakatāne could better leverage its growth and more effectively capitalise on the district's own strengths.	Harness Whakatāne's strengths and the Western Bay of Plenty's economic tailwinds.
5.	Whakatāne's population is aging and also has many young people (especially Māori), but housing, social, and economic opportunities are mismatched to their needs.	Prioritise policies, partnerships and investments that deliver for young people and seniors.

	Key Insight	Principle		
1.	Māori make up nearly half of the population and our relationships with iwi/hapu/whānau are essential for creating all-of-district growth solutions that enable all Whakatāne residents to thrive.	Strengthen relationships with iwi, hāpu and whānau.		
2.	Whakatāne's natural hazard risks and the effects of a changing climate are forcing us to reconsider where we settle, what we invest in, and how we adapt for long-term resilience and prosperity.	Foster communities that are resilient to natural hazards and climate change.		
3.	Whakatāne's natural environment is a taonga and its protection and restoration is vital to our future and the sustained integrity of our ecosystems.	Act as strong stewards of our natural environment.		
4.	Transport is critical to our economic success and to connecting people with opportunities, but aspects of our network struggle with resilience, safety, and missing links.	Enhance transport connectivity, resilience and safety.		
5.	Council's resources are constrained and communities are at the limit of their willingness to pay. Others don't always see council as a pro-growth partner, and current national direction could constrain council's role, functions and priorities.	Align council toward a shared growth and development agenda.
