Community team out and about

Members of the Recovery – Community team are out and about in Edgecumbe this week, going door to door to ensure that everyone is aware of available services. Community Team Lead Barbara Dempsey says where people aren't at home – either because they are out, or the homes are yet to be occupied – a card with contact details will be left. Similar visits will be made to affected properties in other parts of the district in coming days.

"People's needs change throughout the recovery period and we want to make sure that people are aware of what's available to support them in their specific circumstances," Barbara adds.

Extra support for Bay of Plenty farmers

On Friday, the Government announced extra grants to help farmers and growers impacted by April's storms and floods. The funds will be administered by the Whakatāne District Council.

Affected farmers and growers can apply for contributions from the new, \$200,000 Primary Industries Bay of Plenty Flood Recovery Grant, to help with essential infrastructure repair as they continue to get their businesses up and running.

Minister for Primary Industries Hon Nathan Guy says applications can be made to help with specific infrastructure repairs, such as regrassing of pasture, re-sowing of crops, and clean-up of silt and debris.

The grant can cover expenses already incurred or help cover the cost of recovery projects that affected farmers and growers have been putting off up to now.

Strong demand for insulation

Following discussions with the Eastern Bay Energy Trust, the owners of any residential property - anywhere in the Whakatāne district - which was flooded in the April event are asked to contact the Liveable Homes team to talk about their insulation needs. Owners of white-and yellow-stickered homes with no insulation, with or without insurance, can call the Liveable homes team on 027 565 3898 to see what options are available to them. Damaged insulation in uninsured homes can also be replaced. People with insulated and insured homes will still need to work with their insurers to get any issues addressed (which may include EBET support). The Energy Trust's funding aims to ensure that all homeowners affected by the flood will have warmer and healthier homes to live in.

A message from IAG New Zealand

Last week there was quite a bit of discussion about work underway by insurers in Edgecumbe. IAG advises as follows.

IAG is committed to helping our customers to get back on their feet as quickly as possible.

Gary Byrnes, IAG's Manager of Senior Loss Adjusters, says now that all scheduled strip-outs have been completed, independent contractors will be carrying out visual inspections on all stripped out properties for mould and asbestos-containing materials.

"This is to identify whether antimicrobial treatment is required to treat the mould, schedule the required treatment and to ensure the safety of tradesmen involved in the ongoing refurbishment or repair work. Keeping the community safe during the clean-up is important to IAG as is the health and safety of tradesmen. We're unable to complete the refurbishment/repair work until the asbestos survey has been completed."

While the surveys are being carried out, our builders will continue with the scoping and consenting process and will be scheduling appointments with customers to go through the work required to complete the repair. Our loss adjusters are keeping customers updated at least every 10 working days, or every few days for customers in especially vulnerable circumstances.
