Recovery Team welcomes Navigators

The Recovery Team at Whakatāne District Council welcomed a new member this week, with Cheryl Wilson being seconded from Ngāti Awa Social and Health services. Cheryl joins the Recovery Navigator Service, which will work with individuals and families to support them to identify and access the wide range of services available to help with recovery and ongoing wellness.

Te Tohu o Te Ora o Ngāti Awa CEO Enid Ratahi-Pryor says the secondment position is a collaboration between the Recovery Team and Ngāti Awa Social and Health services, enabling two diverse organisations and cultures to work alongside each other to support whānau to rebuild their lives and communities devastated by the April flood and cyclone events.

Funding for the Navigator Service has been secured from the Ministry of Social Development, Bay of Plenty District Health Board and Bay of Plenty Regional Council, with a grant also coming from the Department of Internal Affairs-administered Lottery Grants Board fund for Edgecumbe recovery.

Organised by the Rangitāiki Community Board, the three-hour rolling breakfast celebrated volunteers who have given, and continue to give, their time and skills to help the people of Edgecumbe.

Then when they heard that several Edgumbe students were about to have their ball dreams dashed by the flood, they knew just what to do. After putting the word out for ball gowns for a great cause, Tracey and Anne teamed up with Miemie Vermeulen and Caterina Murphy, Edgumbe College tutors, and set about making some dreams come true. The Shed soon became the caretakers of around 80 gowns, Miemie oversaw fitting and tweaking, and nearly a dozen students did go to the ball after all. Updates

Whakatāne Holiday Park delay

The first portacom units to be installed as temporary housing at the Whakatāne Holiday Park are now expected to be delivered on Friday, 18 August. Delivery has been delayed due to the more complex engineering design work needed for the unit services and foundations, as a result of the underlying ground conditions. The installation of services has also been delayed by adverse weather conditions. Once on site, units are expected to take up to a week to make ready for occupation. All Building Consents are now in hand and once the first units arrive, additional portacabins are expected to be delivered each week through until mid-September.

MPI Fund

The Minister for Primary Industries has earmarked a further \$100,000 to help Bay of Plenty Farmers with recovery following the April flooding and storm events.

This is in addition to the previous round of funding of \$200,000, which has now been fully-allocated.

Primary producers in the area can apply for grants of between \$2000 and \$10,000 per farming business to help towards costs incurred as a result of the storms. Applications will be administered by the Whakatāne District Council.

The only change is that all applications will be considered in one assessment after the funding round closes on 29 September 2017.
