Cheryl Wilson is Kawerau-born and bred and has spent five years as Kaimahi in Kohanga Reo and more than 10 with Ngati Awa Social and Health Services, which has enabled and supported her secondment to the Recovery Team as a Navigator. Cheryl is focused on offering services to the district as a whole and making sure people feel

connected and included. "We want to be a single point of contact for people to get access to the services they need – and if we're not the best fit for what is needed, then we'll find out who is. We'll be working with all the agencies and services, because cooperation is the key to getting people's lives back to a good place."

Vicky Richards will be familiar to many people in the Eastern Bay through her work with Sport BOP, as well as her involvement in many community projects over the years. Vicky is a long-time resident of Edgecumbe and her property was severely damaged in the April floods, so she has first-hand experience of what others are going through. all about supporting people in getting back to their homes," she says. "Everyone is at a different stage, facing different challenges and on a journey, so I see my job as identifying their needs and helping them move forward."

Edgecumbe Lions Club distribution to floodaffected residents

Edgecumbe Lions Club members will be at Te Tari Awhina – Community Hub at Edgecumbe Library, from 9am - 1pm this Saturday (2 September) and Saturday 9 September, to distribute gift vouchers to flood-affected Edgecumbe households.

Club Treasurer Don Ford says vouchers worth \$250 will be available for each affected property and will be redeemable at a number of local businesses.

Flood-affected residents wishing to claim the vouchers relating to their property should go to Te Tari Awhina between 9am and 1pm this Saturday or Saturday 9 September, with ID and proof of address. Recovery Team staff and supporters will be lending a hand to check recipients off against the list of affected properties.

Originally, Edgecumbe Lions had planned to distribute the vouchers when the majority of people were back in their homes, but Mr Ford says feedback is that many displaced residents could benefit from them now, as they are travelling back into town on a more regular basis and accessing services. The Club initiative has the potential to inject around \$60,000 into the local business community.

Fruitful endeavours in Waimana

Nearly 100 fruit trees will be putting down roots throughout the Eastern Bay thanks to a Pride Whakatāne initiative. For the past five years, and in cooperation with Whakatane District Council, the group has coordinated the donation of single species trees to schools and other organisations, but this year it was decided that fruit trees were in order and the recipients would be people affected by the April floods. Whakatāne District Councillor and Pride Whakatāne Chairman Andrew lles says the trees include apricots, lemons, pears, apples, and mandarins among others, and the response has been so overwhelming that the group is seriously considering a second project. "We'd like to thank Waimea Nurseries in Nelson for coming to the party and covering all freight costs to get the trees up here," he says. "The trees will be going out to
