Mall carpark resealing

There will be some activity around the Riverslea Mall carpark for the next couple of weeks, as the area used by Whakatāne District Council as a post-flood refuse transfer station is repaired and resealed.

The contractor will maintain access to the car park for vehicles and pedestrians during the works, but some areas will be fenced off for safety reasons.

Having a central staging area for refuse management during the initial months of Recovery was hugely beneficial, with approximately 3000 tonnes of waste passing through the area in 16 weeks. The Recovery Team thanks the Mall owners for making the area available.
