Plans are underway for a community-wide event to acknowledge the anniversary of 6 April 2017 and to also acknowledge all of those who have played a part in the ongoing Recovery process.

Edgecumbe Community Plan Coordinator Vicky Richards, Rangitāīki Community Board Chair Charelle Stevenson, other interested community members and organisations, together with the Whakatāne District Council-led Recovery Office, are working on the detailed plan.

Rebuilding the community – piece by piece

Sixty-three percent of the properties damaged in the April 2017 storm and flood events have now been repaired and occupiers are back home.

Recovery Built Team Lead Julian Reweti says the majority of the remaining 112 affected home-owners have a rebuild plan in place or underway. He says Community Navigators and the Building Navigator continue to work with those who are facing difficulties getting through the recovery process.

In particular, 304 moderately damaged (yellow stickered) homes required repair across the district; 52 of the impacted properties were in Taneatua, Rūātoki and Poroporo.



An update from Bay of Plenty **Regional Council**

Demolition works on the Regional Council's College Road site are finishing up, with the last of the rubble being removed and the area undergoing a general tidy up. Fences are also being put up alongside neighbouring properties.

Waiotahi Contractors has been awarded the contract for stopbank reconstruction works and the company will start getting ready to take over the site in coming weeks. Apart from some preliminary activities, the contractor expects to be fully on site around the middle of this month. College Road will be closed during the work period and there will be public notices and electronic signs to inform road users. A blessing will take place before works begin and there will be more information available on that shortly.

The Regional Council will be working with the Rangitāīki Community Board, Community Plan Coordinator and Whakatāne District Council on options around pathways, connectivity, services and other aspects of the land reinstatment project.

Work on the second mural in E.D.I.T.'s healing and beautification vision for Edgecumbe kicks off on Monday.



Edgecumbe Community Plan progresses

Vicky Richards says attendees at a recent Edgecumbe Community Plan workshop can best be described as 'a room full of doers'.

"It was really neat to have representatives from around 10 community groups and organisations come along and especially heartening to see people starting to connect and identify where they could be working collaboratively.

We went over the ideas generated in the Peter Kenyon workshop last year and people were asked to rank the suggestions so that priorities can be identified. I'm in the middle of collating all that data now and the next step is to write a project plan that will be presented back to the oversight committee."
