Supreme Winners

Rangitāiki Floodway and midden site

Works are continuing on the Rangitāiki Floodway Project to increase the capacity of the floodway and reduce flood levels in the main Rangitāiki River channel. The project will result in reduced pressure on the Rangitāiki River stopbanks during periods of extreme river flow.

Current works are downstream of Thornton Road on the true left bank. This stage includes earthworks to relocate stopbanks, increase canal capacity through widening and works on internal drainage systems. The Regional Council is currently working with local landowners on future options for the floodway and a change of consent.

While removing topsoil, in the location planned for the site office, contractors discovered an area with a large amount of shells. A new location was found for the office and works continued in other areas while the site was investigated. Local archaeologist, Lynda Walter, was pleased to identify the site as a midden (historic rubbish dump) with two concentrations of shell midden, charcoal rich soils, fire-cracked rocks within a black sandy soil and several flakes of obsidian.

Further work is not planned in that location until the next construction season, so archaeologists have plenty of time to investigate the site more fully and we look forward to sharing what they learn.

College Road update

In spite of a slight delay caused by last weekend's extreme weather, the contractor is moving ahead with works and making good progress on the College Road stopbank repair.

They are currently moving services (water, communications and power) and have begun preparing the seepage trench and foundations for the new stopbank.
