Liveable Homes Project update

The Liveable Homes Project is making good progress in helping homeowners who don't have the means to repair their own flood-damaged properties.

Since the programme was initiated earlier this month, the Liveable Homes team has gained better information about the numbers of property owners who will need assistance. Of the 243 yellow-stickered houses in Edgecumbe and 37 yellow-stickered houses in other parts of the Whakatāne District, we now estimate that 40-50 homeowners may need help to restore their homes to a liveable standard.

To date, 17 homes have been registered with the programme. Strip-outs have been completed on four houses, which are now in the drying-out phase.

Liveable Homes coordinator John Pullar has expressed the team's gratitude to NAVA - the Ngāti Awa Volunteer Army - which continues to organise skilled volunteers to help with house strip-outs.

Please take care!

While testing has shown there is no heavy metal contamination in Edgecumbe, people still need to be aware of other potential health risks from unsafe handling of flood-contaminated material.

To ensure your personal safety:

- Wear appropriate personal protection equipment when clearing sites, under taking strip-outs of buildings and removing silt
- Wash hands often; and make sure you check children are washing their hands regularly and wearing enclosed footwear (no jandals or bare feet).

Task Force Green

Task Force Green teams are out and about clearing fence lines, silted paddocks and flood and tree debris on rural properties. The Ministry of Social Development has made \$360,000 available for Task Force Green initiatives in the Whakatāne District and to date, 61 farms have registered for help. Mayoral Relief Fund update

Planning continues on the structure and application process for the district's Mayoral Relief Fund. An Advisory Board has been formed to provide 'on-the-ground' advice to Trustees, which Deputy Mayor Judy Turner says will help ensure fair and equitable administration of the fund.

Temporary accommodation update

MBIE (the Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment) is working with the Whakatane District Council to get 10 relocatable homes established onsite at the Whakatāne Domain Holiday Park.

Vehicle access and connections to water and wastewater services are required, so it will be some time before these self-contained, two-bedroom units are ready for people to move in.

Site assessments, for those who have registered an interest in having a portable cabin sited on their properties, are also underway and are expected to be completed in the next 2-3 weeks.

The cabins themselves are in short supply in the region, so MBIE is working with suppliers to secure cabins as they become available.
