Project snapshot for the Tāneatua-Waimana Community Board area

ere is a snapshot of some the key projects proposed for the Taneatua-Waimana Community Board area during the next 10 years. Wainui/Burma Road improvements

We are looking to upgrade some specific sections of Wainui Road to improve road safety. Several sharp bends on Wainui Road, east of the intersection with Burma Rd, have a high crash rate. We are proposing to realign these bends in the 2020-21 year at a cost of \$670,000.

Taneatua Sewerage Treatment Plant upgrade

The resource consent to discharge treated effluent from the Tāneatua Sewage Treatment Plant is due to expire in 2026. To obtain a new resource consent, we may have to carry out upgrades to the existing treatment plant and improve treated effluent quality. Council is proposing to set aside \$2.6 million for upgrades in the 2019-23 period of the Long Term Plan.

Taneatua Road and Reid Road resilience improvements

There are two sections of Taneatua Road which are prone to flooding during severe weather events. The State Highway either side of Taneatua is often closed due to flooding at the same time, effectively isolating the entire community south of the flooded sections, so this project will significantly reduce the frequency of road closures due to flooding on Taneatua Road. Council is proposing that \$768,750 be budgeted for this work to be carried out in the 2020-21 period of the Long Term Plan.

New public toilets at Mitchell Park

We are proposing to develop a new public toilet facility in Mitchell Park, Tāneatua to replace the existing portaloo. Construction would be scheduled for the 2016-17 period at a cost of \$135,000.



TĀNEATUA

The average property in Tāneatua (capital value of \$112,000) is expected to see a 2.15% increase in rates for the 2015-16 year. This equates to an additional \$47.08 on the annual rates bill and is below the average District rates increase of 3.20%. This change is due to an increase in the General Rate requirement, Uniform Annual General Charge and Sewerage rates, but is also partially offset by small reductions in other areas.

RURAL AVERAGE

An average rural property (capital value of \$865,000) will see an increase of 2.43%, which equates to approximately \$78.94 in 2015/16 and is also below the District average increase of 3.2%. This is principally due to an increase in the general rate requirement, which is partly offset by a decrease in the capital value-based roading rate.

RURAL HIGH

The average high value rural property (capital value of \$2.37 million) will see a 2.30% rates increase, which is about \$156 in 2015/16. This is principally due to an increase in the general rate requirement, which is partly offset a decrease in the capital value-based roading rate.

Key services provided in the Tāneatua-Waimana area

hakatāne District Council is responsible for delivering a wide range of essential services and facilities including water supplies, sewage treatment and disposal, solid waste management, roads and footpaths, parks and reserves, libraries, economic development and animal control, to name a few. Additionally, many key services located in the Whakatāne township also provide services to the communities of the Tāneatua- Waimana area such as the Whakatāne Museum and Research Centre, Whakatāne Aquatic Centre and War Memorial Hall.

Some examples of key services located in the Tāneatua-Waimana Community Board Area include:

- Tāneatua, Waimana and Rūātoki water supply schemes
- Tāneatua Sewerage Scheme
- Tāneatua Stormwater systems
- Tāneatua Community Hall, Waimana-Nukuhou War Memorial Hall
- Weekly rubbish and recycling collections and fortnightly greenwaste collections for urban and some rural areas
- Extensive road network
- A number of reserves, sportsfields and play equipment.
