Inspection of the Old Rangitāiki Channel outlet

Bay of Plenty Regional Council is undertaking works at the Old Rangitāiki Channel outlet (near the Tarawera River mouth), which may impact beach access for the next few weeks.

Seepage has been discovered around the structure, which means there is water seeping out under the current floodgate structure and bypassing the gate where the water is supposed to flow through in a controlled manner.

If there was a flood event, or significant increase in the river water level, this seepage could result in failure of the floodgate and potentially cause flooding downstream.

Using big metal sheets (sheet piles), Regional Council will create a temporary metal box around the structure. This will keep water out of the structure and let our team inspect its condition. This inspection will help inform the repair work required to extend the life of the structure.

Inserting the piles will require excavation in and around the structure. During this time, access to the Tarawera River mouth (eastern side) off Thornton Road may be limited or closed.

The river mouth can be accessed from the western side of the Tarawera River, or via the beach access track in Matatā.

We appreciate the community's patience during this time.

Te Niaotanga ō Mataatua ō Te Arawa Matatā Wastewater Project – community update

Te Tauihu o te Waka - "Navigating the bow of the canoe, in the right direction, together"

The Project is progressing steadily with a current focus on environmental monitoring and identifying preferred discharge to land sites. We are now starting to develop a greater understanding of what is occurring, meaning we can make positive steps towards a solution.

What's been happening...

- The Co-Design Group continue to meet monthly, which includes having several technical workshops and iwi/hapū specific wananga. Just before Christmas there was a site visit out to Iramoko Marae. The wānanga focused on developing the cultural narrative and identification of wāhi tapu sites.
- The technical team have been busy out and about monitoring several surface water and ground water sites across Matatā. Surface water monitoring has been undertaken monthly for the last 15 months and groundwater for the last nine months.

In total 11 surface water sites are being consistently monitored. Including, five sites within or upstream of the Matatā township, three sites along the Tarawera River, two in the Matatā Lagoon and one at a Bay of Plenty Regional Council testing site.

Testing regularly means we are capturing consistent and up-to-date data about the current environment in Matatā.

• Ecological and invertebrate monitoring has been undertaken. Ecological testing looks at things like the natural landscape and environment. Invertebrate monitoring looks for animals like snails, insect larvae and worms (cold blooded animals with no backbone) to see if they're present in the area. The team have been testing for these species in the Awakaponga Stream and the Tarawera River.

Fun fact... in the Awakaponga Stream the team found a diverse fish community including inanga, longfin eel and giant bully.

• We have worked hard to identify possible sites for land disposal. Field investigations have started with early testing currently underway. This includes taking soil samples and testing the depth of the water table under the ground. At this stage we are unable to identify the actual locations until all test results are in. This allows us to decide whether or not we move to the next steps, as well as continue our ongoing conversations with the site landowner.
