Activities on the trip included a soak in De Bretts hotpools, a boat cruise on Lake Taupō to see the Ngātoroirangi rock carving and learn of the history of the area, mini golf and the Rock n Ropes high ropes course.

The trip was rounded off with a mandatory photo with the famous #LOVETAUPO sign, and a crack at the hole in one on the lake.





MATATĀ WASTEWATER UPDATE

Ground and surface water testing at key sites in and around Matatā will kick off next month as the project team continues to progress through the steps to find a suitable wastewater solution for the town.

The testing will provide better understanding and robust data on the environmental effects of the current septic tank/effluent disposal field systems, which is important information for more detailed assessments that may be needed as the project progresses.

Project Manager Janeane Joyce is very pleased that plans are being finalised to bring on two suitably skilled people to assist the cultural overlay workstream. "This work underpins the project and unlocks our ability to engage with tangata whenua and the community. Background relationship and technical work will continue to the end of this year, and in the first quarter of next year we look forward to being able to talk to the community first, and those interested in the wider district, about progress as we work with the Co-design Governance Group on possible solutions."

FIRE AND EMERGENCY NEW ZEALAND

Fire and Emergency New Zealand have now established 17 unified Districts across the country, doing away with the historic split of urban and rural areas.

Within the Bay of Plenty district, there are six career fire stations and 34 volunteer fire brigades, with one industrial brigade. With the new structure comes a new district team and a renewed focus on community engagement.

This team is split into two areas. The Risk Reduction team cover both technical building and compliance advice, along with fire investigation.
