Liveable Homes Project update

The Eastern Bay Energy Trust has announced funding towards ensuring that all of the district's flood-affected residents return to warmer and healthier, insulated homes. The funds are being made available to the Liveable Homes Project, which is coordinating qualified tradespeople and volunteers to people who don't have the means to repair their houses to a habitable standard. The Project could involve up to 282 identified properties in Edgecumbe, the wider Rangitāiki Plains, Paroa, Tāneatua, and Rūātoki areas.

Acting Chairman of the Eastern Bay Energy Trust, David Bulley, says the Trust wants everyone to have the opportunity to benefit from improved insulation as part of the support package. "Our support includes those who are insured, but who may find that their rebuild doesn't extend to installing insulation. If that's the case, EBET funding will be available to assist with the cost."

Pou Whakaaro steps up in recovery

When the floods struck
Edgecumbe and other parts
of the Whakatāne District
last month, Pou Whakaaro
Whakatāne knew their
recently acquired new
premises meant they had the
facilities to help.

"Naturally we wanted to offer any assistance we could," says Claire Pye, Pou Whakaaro General Manager, "and as we didn't have a tenant in the rear of our No. 1 Bracken Street premises, we decided to put it to good use. Within the

first week of opening our doors, we had items pouring in – 20 double pallets of furniture arrived in the first week from Whanganui alone!"

Pou Whakaaro now takes in donations of furniture and appliances, all of which are checked and tested, where applicable, before finding new homes with those affected by the flooding. "Basically we see our mission as building better communities," Ms Pye says, "but it's also about being a good neighbour: the people of Edgecumbe are our neighbours, so we want to help them out wherever we can. One of our great strengths is being able to put people in touch with one another and with useful resources and services, and this has been an integral part of the recovery in general."

While furniture and household items are continuing to come in, Ms Pye says storage space is also in big demand. "People who have been flooded need somewhere to store belongings while they are getting back on their feet and their homes are being repaired, so if you have a clean, dry garage or some storage space that they can use, then we'd like to hear from you. And of course we are always looking for volunteers — if you have a few hours to spare a week, we have something for you to do, from data entry to furniture distribution. Give us a call — your help will be appreciated!"

Biosecurity

Be aware of the biosecurity risks
that may arise when buying in feed, bringing
in contractor machinery and when stock
return to your property. Make sure they are
all 'clean'. Monitor affected land for new
weeds and grasses in the coming spring/
summer. The Regional Council biosecurity
team can provide an advisory service if
anything of concern is detected.

Pest control

A rat trapping programme is underway in the red sticker area in Edgecumbe, as a precautionary measure. There is no danger to wandering domestic pets from this.

College Road

The temporary road now has two-lane access. The footpath is formed and separation barriers have been installed.

Cleaning of stormwater cesspits and major lateral lines is underway in Edgecumbe, using a vacuum tanker and a specialised drain cleaning water blaster.
